On Thursday 22 September 1994 we opened our doors for the very first time. Thirty years on, not only has the Hospice grown, but our services have grown too, as we continue to build on our ambition to provide "the Rainbows experience wherever you are".

We're proud to now have Rainbows Nurses in hospitals across the region. This year we're also planning to introduce our Community Hubs, meaning we'll be able to provide our services to our families wherever they are.

Looking back over 30 years of Rainbows provides the perfect opportunity to recognise how much you, our amazing supporters, have helped make possible.

It's hard to imagine a time when babies, children and young people with serious and terminal conditions didn't have access to hospices like Rainbows. # Laya's Story

Laya is a little girl with a rare genetic condition who relies on the specialised care offered at Rainbows.

"Rainbows means I have a family and a home in the UK." These are the words of Fareda, whose six-year-old daughter is cared for by us.

Laya has a severe neurodisability due to a rare genetic condition called UFSP2 gene. She also has epilepsy and developmental delay, which means she has constant seizures.

"There are a lot of unanswered questions about Laya's condition as it is extremely rare, with only 14 cases worldwide," said Fereda. "It has been identified as a fairly new condition and still needs a lot of research.

"Another problem is that the Cerebellum in Laya's brain is not developing as normal. It is actually getting smaller and there is nothing they can do to stop it."

When Laya was born everything seemed to be fine but at four-months-old she started having seizures which were diagnosed as epilepsy. An MRI scan and a range of tests at six-months-old indicated that Laya had underlying Mitochondrial Disease, a very rare life limiting condition.

Fareda was also told that her daughter would never eat or drink orally and that eventually she would lose all capacity to talk, walk or would never have a normal development. "I was told to expect a very short life expectancy for Laya. This was extremely difficult for me to accept and caused me huge anxiety and worries."

Against all odds, Laya improved after four months and she started eating and drinking.

Her communication skills also improved and there was an increase in her development.

Fareda is a single parent and relies on the support of our charity.

Fareda added: "I have no family in England and have been on my own for six years, Rainbows has been like a second home to me. Rainbows is like my family. I have no one I can rely on as it is specialised care. But with Rainbows, I feel like everyone knows what to do. I cannot leave Laya anywhere else and go for a break for a few hours, other than at Rainbows as I know she is in really good hands. And she is safe.

### "We have been coming to Rainbows since Laya was six-months-old. It is just amazing. It is a great place for relaxation and has great facilities. I get a much needed break. I wish I could pay back or do something to say thank you.

"Laya continues to teach me about life and together we face new challenges. She reminds me to find the beauty in everything and to be strong and brave, just as she is. She reminds me to smile because life has been tough, she reminds me to always see the light, as she's such a bright shining star. I am so blessed to be her mother.

"She is my greatest blessing. Without her, I wouldn't be as strong as I am today. Laya has taught me to respect and appreciate all the little things in life and not to worry. Struggles lead to great victory."



# **Our amazing supporters**

### Sporting Bears Motor Club drives support to £44,000

An organisation which offers "Dream Rides" for motor enthusiasts has raised £44,000 for us.

Sporting Bears Motor Club has been supporting our charity since 2008 and has just handed over its most recent donation of £9.300.

Set up in 1989, Sporting Bears Motor Club, and its members, visit motor shows with their classic cars. People can then choose a car they would like to be taken for a spin in and make a donation for their Dream Rides.

Alan Moss, Chairman of the Sporting Bears Motor Club, said: "As we are a motor club and not a business, we don't charge for our Dream Rides but we ask people to make a donation. The British public are very generous and we find they are always happy to support charities, especially ones like Rainbows, and 100 percent of all of our donations go to the charities.

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"Our group is also very proud to be involved with Rainbows. Some of us have visited the Hospice and it is very close to our hearts. And our drivers, who provide the Dream Rides, ream do so out of their own pockets. They don't charge for fuel or the upkeep of the cars. We are delighted to have raised so much over the years."

### Superstar dad rides to Paris for Rainbows in memory of his son

A father cycled 428 miles from Loughborough to Paris and raised £8,060 in memory of his son.

After a long battle with illness, Alex was 16 when he died at our Hospice in August 2022. He had Ollier's disease, a rare bone condition, and Pulmonary Hypertension, which causes high blood pressure and affects the heart and lungs.

His father, Richard, is forever grateful to our staff for the care given to Alex, and the support provided for his family.

"Rainbows made a horrendous experience so much more bearable," said Richard. "The hospice and the staff were fantastic."

> "Alex had his first operation when he was 10-weeks-old. He was very small and even at 16, he was only one metre tall. At the age of 10, he was diagnosed with Pulmonary Hypertension after his lung collapsed, and we had a lengthy stay in hospital.

"Alex was ill throughout his life, and when his lung collapsed it was a major shock. He was in and out of hospital regularly, but took everything in his stride. He was so positive towards everything. At one stage there was the option of a transplant but as time progressed, his options diminished and ultimately there were none. That was extremely hard to deal with."

Richard describes his son as a wonderful chatterbox who flourished at school and loved life. Despite being so poorly, Alex was determined to sit all of his GCSEs, and was able to do so. Unfortunately Alex never knew that he passed all of his exams, or got to complete his dream of going to Loughborough College.

Richard said: "I am so proud of what he achieved in his life. He was developing into a beautiful young man and to be told he was dying was devastating.

"Alex loved Rainbows. It was a really positive place for him. There is sadness there but all of the experiences are wonderful. He loved to go swimming, he loved to bake. He would chat to anyone. We made the most of our time and it was as good of a situation as it could have been."

# **Freddie's Story**

### Rainbows is the beacon of light at the end of the tunnel for Freddie's family.

Four-year-old Freddie began having constant seizures when he was just two-weeks-old and he was rushed into hospital. His parents Catherine and Andrew said it was a very frightening experience.

Scans showed baby Freddie had Polymicrogyria, where the brain doesn't develop properly during pregnancy and Calcification, a condition characterised by abnormal deposits of calcium in blood vessels within the brain. He also has parts of his brain missing.

"The three issues together are a ridiculous amount of medical issues and it is only getting worse," said Catherine. "Having the three conditions together is very rare. We have been told there are only a handful of cases worldwide."

Freddie needs round the clock care as his epilepsy is difficult to control. The support the family has received from our charity since 2020, has been a "game changer" and Catherine and Andrew value our Hospice that helps not only Freddie, but his seven-year-old sister, Lizzie.

Freddie has Global Development Delay and is visually impaired, only seeing shapes and colours. He is also non-verbal and non-mobile - a dislocated hip and issues with his wrists and thumbs add more strain.

### "Rainbows gives us something to look forward to," said Catherine. "It is a beacon of light at the end of the tunnel. Freddie loves Rainbows. He has become much more relaxed and is the best version of himself right now.

"He loves Music Therapy and massages from the Rainbows Complementary Therapists. He can't swim in public pools but he can swim in the Hydrotherapy Pool at Rainbows, and he can swim with his sister.

"Rainbows has also been great for Lizzie. She was struggling but she has benefit from the Rainbows Sibling Services, which has included counselling, and that has made such a difference. She idolises Freddie but sometimes it is good for him to be at Rainbows and for us to have time with her as she misses out on such a lot.

"We know Freddie isn't going to have a long life," said Catherine. "We could have weeks, we could have years. He is susceptible to chest infections, which are very dangerous for him.

"We take each day as it comes and handle it with difficulty, we didn't actually realise how serious his condition was until earlier this year. We now have to think quality over quantity and make the days as happy as we can. It takes too much energy to be sad."
